When I arrived in Kenya, I stayed in the Kakuma refugee camp with others from Sudan and neighboring countries, too. I lived in Kakuma for almost ten years.

When it was finally time to go to the United States, I wasn't afraid, I was happy and excited! Though everything was strange when I first arrived, it's no longer strange anymore; I have learned a lot about American culture. I like that I am able to go to school now, that I can learn about technology, and make a good life. One difficult thing about living in the United States is that sometimes people don't trust each other here.

I want to finish college and become a pharmacist. I would like to go back to Sudan and help my people get medicine. Right now I attend Phoenix college.
