NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR



It is with great pleasure that I share with you details about our expansion and the exciting direction. The Origins Project is headed in the year to come. Due in part to generous support from our donors, and also because of our growing international profile, The Origins Project continues to develop in its dual role in fostering forefront research and also engaging the public in the newest and most exciting ideas and individuals who help develop them.

In 2015 we launched a new event format with Alan Alda and Noam Chomsky in our Origins Project Dialogue series. We held a scientific workshop and Great Debate Extinctions: Tragedy to Opportunity, which included key figures such as ASU President Michael Crow, Director of ASU's School of Earth and Space Exploration Lindy Elkins-Tanton, Diane Ackerman, Svante Paabo, Ian Tattersall, and Neil Gershenfeld. Nobel Laureate Frank Wilczek was our Visiting Distinguished Professor during spring 2015 semester, and I am happy to share that he is planning on returning soon. We provided a variety of awards and sponsorships, including our inaugural Origins Project Postdoctoral Prize Lectureship to winner Adrian Liu. We hosted Liu for a week at ASU where we hosted four talks of his, including his public lecture Observing Our Origins in the First Galaxy. We hope that you were able to attend these and others. For those who were unable to, I encourage you to watch the video recordings of those noted and additional events we held abroad, available on our Origins Project YouTube channel.

In 2016 we aim to explore and bring topics to the public within the scope of Life and Death in the 21st Century. As we embark on the new academic year, there is much to look forward to, by means of education and community outreach with unique online content via our newly announced Origins Education Portal, and exclusive and public events around origins and our future. This fall we welcome Peter Singer as a Visiting Distinguished Professor who will join me for an Origins Project Dialogue on Ethics for the 21st Century, and panel on Evolving Ethics: Food, Sex and Death. We have offerings of multiple awards and scholarships to many, including undergraduate, graduate, and postdoctoral students at ASU and beyond, as well as new and expanded support for faculty research designed to help support and nurture their growth and exploration in areas relative to The Origins Project. In spring 2016 we will host a number of events, many of which will be announced soon, including Dialogues with Hugh Downs and Mariette DiChristina as well as Great Debates.

We have many new faces on our team who are talented, enthusiastic and committed to our success and positive impact in the community. With this expanded team we will be able to offer more and extend our reach to better serve and create more opportunities for experts, the general public, and all in between to engage and get involved.

We are excited to present the first offering from the Origins Portal, the Origins of Violence: An Overview. The curated materials found in the Origins of Violence are informed and inspired by one of our high-level academic workshops held in April 2014. Led by Harvard Professor of Psychology Steven Pinker, this workshop featured the world's top scholars in deep discussion about the socio-cultural and neuro-biological forms of violence. Topics ranged from its evolutionary utility in primates and early humans to the success of nonviolent protests propelling wide scale social change. We have used the workshop as a reference point for the Origins of Violence: An Overview, as well as supplemented relevant information that we believe necessary for a more robust understanding of violence - its roots, evolution, and means of mitigation.

We hope that you will use this information, share it on social media, talk to your friends about it, and help us create a more equitable world for humanity.

UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIP REOPENS IN MAY 2016

The Origins Project is excited to announce the winners of the inaugural Undergraduate Research Scholarship. These scholarship funds for joint research projects between ASU undergraduates and their faculty mentors consist of a \$5,000 research fund for both the student and their mentor, for a total of \$10,000 awarded per project.











FACULTY RESEARCH FUNDING REOPENS IN FEBRUARY 2016

The Origins Project will sponsor a limited number of ASU faculty members whose origins-related research project would benefit from additional funding. Professor Rogier Windhorst's project 3D IMAGINE was awarded \$1,000 in 2015 Faculty Research Funding. Regents Professor in the School of Earth and Space Exploration, Rogier Windhorst's 3D Imagine project is focused on developing alternative learning tools for visually impaired astronomy students.

VISITING DISTINGUISHED PROFESSORS

The Origins Project hosts distinguished professors at ASU where they spend periods ranging from a week to a full term meeting with students, engaging in research, giving public lectures, and collaborating with faculty and students in accordance with the mission of the project. Visiting distinguished professors this year will include the following:



FRANK WILCZEK

Nobel Laureate, Professor Frank Wilczek will be joining us from his home institution of Massachusetts Institute of Technology during the 2015-2016 academic year. He previously visited Arizona State University during spring semesters in 2011-2015.



PETER SINGER

Peter Singer is an Australian moral philosopher. He is the Ira W. DeCamp Professor of Bioethics at Princeton University and a Laureate Professor at the Centre. Professor Singer was inducted into the United States Animal Rights Hall of Fame in 2000. He will be visiting ASU this fall semester.



SIDNEY ALTMAN

Nobel Laureate, Professor Sid Altman will be visiting from his home institution of Yale University during the fall 2015 semester. He previously joined us at ASU during spring semesters in 2011 and 2013.

POSTDOCTORAL AWARD LECTURESHIP

The Origins Project offers an annual program honoring a recent postdoctoral researcher in any area of Origins Project activities, from any country in the world. This program brings the winning candidate to ASU for a week where they will lecture on his or her areas of expertise, addressing faculty, students, and also the general public. This award includes \$10,000 to be awarded to the winner, making it the largest prize of its kind in the world.

The inaugural winner was Adrian Liu, from the University of California, Berkeley Center for Cosmological Physics. We encourage you to watch his talk on Observing Our Origins in the First Galaxies on our ASU Origins Project YouTube channel.



THE NORM PERRILL ORIGINS PROJECT SCHOLARSHIP

The Norm Perrill Origins Project Scholarship is made possible by the generosity of ASU Professor Emeritus Dr. Norm Perrill and is awarded annually to one ASU graduate student

and one ASU undergraduate student who demonstrate academic excellence and show academic rigor in Origins-related issues.





The 2015-16 Norm Perrill Origins Project Scholarship winners include Biology PhD student Eric Woolf and Physics and Astrophysics undergraduate student Carl E. Fields. Woolf is studying the development of cancer cells and Fields' research interests include compact objects, supernovae and stellar physics. Applications will open again in December 2015.
