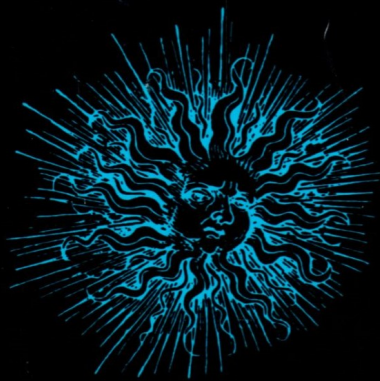


List of Contributors

- Jack Breckenridge,** is a Professor of Art at Arizona State University. He studied with Hans Hofmann in New York in 1952, the Saugatuck Summer School and has degrees from the University of Wisconsin and the University of Iowa (MFA), where he was a Woodrow Wilson fellow. His current interests are American and European painting after World War II.
- Ju-hsi Chou,** is an Associate Professor of Art at Arizona State University. He received his Ph.D. from Princeton University. A specialist in later Chinese painting, he has published articles dealing with the Ming and Ch'ing artists and art theory.
