
Dear Dr. Hamburger:

Your letter of the 8th interests me very much. I have long felt that Coghill's studies on mitosis and early differentiation should be followed up systematically, for these activities lie at the foundation of the mechanisms of development of the apparatus of behavior. At the time when Coghill left the Wistar his study of succeeding stages of limb development were well advanced but not completed or written up. How much of this can be salvaged from his records remains to be seen.

All of Coghill's material and records are now in the hands of Dr. Roofe at the University of Kansas and he is inaugurating a long-time program of Coghillian research as a memorial to him. Roof himself is working on the development of the muscular system of *Amblystoma*. You will find it profitable, I think, to keep in touch with that program. In this field informal collaboration of all workers is the surest way to speed up the work with minimum of lost motion.

Unfortunately I have no duplicates of Coghill's reprints. I find, however, an extra set of the Herrick Volumes of *J. Comp. Neur.* (56 and 57) which contains the paper that you want. I am sending these volumes to you by post, with my compliments.
