Dear Dr. Hamburger:


Levi-Montalcini's findings have interested me very much and the current program promises important results. I do not recall anything in the older literature that bears on your question. I am making no attempt to keep up with current publications. Don Barron and the others who are active in your field are more likely to know what there is in print about the subject.

Mr. Shieh's experiment seems to clinch the argument about the cervical nucleus of Terni. I return his sketch and thank you for calling my attention to this work.

One of Paul Roofe's young men, Dr. Wenger, was trained by Dr. Lowry and his team is doing excellent work on the chemistry of development. I am delighted with the rapid progress of his program of continuing the work which Coghill did at the Univ. of Kansas. He has all of Coghill's specimens and papers and also his library. My own micro slides have been added to that collection and my papers will ultimately be filed with his archives of Coghilliana.
